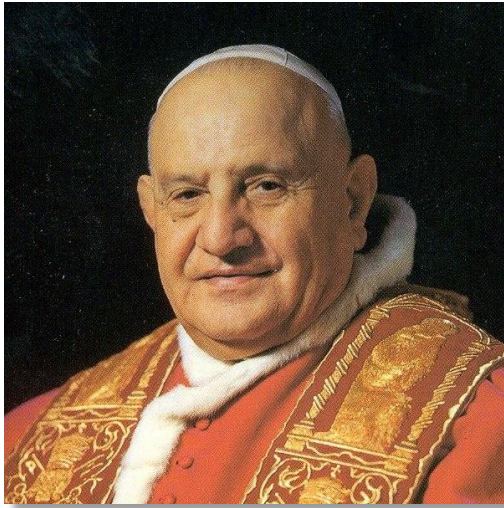
SECOND FRIDAYS: Adoration & Reconciliation continues on Friday, 13 October 2017 from 3–5 p.m. All are welcome!

OCTOBER SAINT: In April 2014, Pope Francis declared two 20th-century popes Saints, both of whom revolutionized the papacy in their unique ways, and both of whom are remembered in October. “Good Pope John” is remembered on October 11th, the day in 1962, he opened the 2nd Vatican Council. St. John XXIII, as Pope, sought to open the dialogue between the church and the world. He forever changed the church’s notion of the papacy. What he began at Vatican II and what continued under his successor, Servant of God Pope Paul VI would effect change on almost every facet of the church. Such reforms continue to be felt, understood, and implemented.

Born to peasant farmers near Bergamo in 1881, Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli would enjoy a 1st-rate education, eventually earning a doctorate in Theology. He would go on to teach, and even serve as a hospital orderly during World War I. His subsequent research in the Ambrosian Library in

Milan put him in touch with Achille Ratti, the future Pius XI, who would later appoint Roncalli to what would be a long and distinguished diplomatic career. This would send Roncalli to Bulgaria, Turkey, and Greece. In Turkey, he developed good relations with the Orthodox Church. In Greece during the German occupation, Roncalli helped prevent the deportation of Jews. As nuncio to France, Roncalli smoothed friction between those working with the Vichy regime and the opposition.

By 1953 Angelo Roncalli would find himself as the newly appointed Patriarch of Venice. As Patriarch he was known for pastoral zeal, firm opposition to Communism and informality. In 1958, following the death of the long-reigning Pius XII, Angelo Cardinal Roncalli was elected to the See of Peter. Many saw the 77 year old man as a “caretaker” pope until a conclave would elect a more significant candidate. Little did the cynics know that the newly crowned John XXIII would turn the church upside-down. Immediately John XXIII would define the papacy as a pastoral role. Then he set out to begin his reforms!

A revision of the Code of Canon Law and a synod for the diocese of Rome were among his initial tasks. An ecumenical council, however, would be the decisive moment in his short papacy. His *aggiornamento* as he called it was to be a new Pentecost for the church that sought to bring together the separated, and usher the church into the 20th century. Despite painful cancer, St. John XXIII set in motion sweeping changes. Even his encyclicals had a more pastoral than dogmatic tenor.

Good Pope John was a man of dialogue, despite creedal differences. He began what would

become significant ecumenical efforts with the Orthodox and Protestant churches, and especially with Jews, to whom he introduced himself with the words: *I am Joseph, your brother!* This jovial and down-to-earth man never lost sight of his humble origins, notwithstanding his lettered past. He embraced his long final suffering with dignity. His death in 1963 was felt deeply by Catholics and non-Catholics around the globe. Pope John Paul II, the pope with whom he would be canonized, beatified him in 2000, along with Pius IX and Benedictine [Columba Marmion](#).
